Call for Papers

Concept Note:

"Mahatma Gandhi was a futurist in the best sense of the word. He foresaw trends and had the confidence to record his predictions and prescriptions in bold and stark terms. He did so... with *Hind Swaraj*..." [N. Ramakrishnan in *Reading Gandhi in the Twenty-First Century*, Palgrave Macmillan, 2013:2]

Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi (popularly known and addressed as Mahatma Gandhi as well as 'the father of the nation' and 'Bapu') returned to India on January 9, 1915, from South Africa. Since then, he actively participated in and led various movements, protests, and marches and even fasted to mark his protest silently and non-violently to free his nation from the clutches of the British rulers. Because of his pacifist civil disobedience and leadership, the British Government always took him as a threat to its throne. Gandhi's political activism began in 1917-1918 when he took up the issues of Champaran farmers, the Ahmedabad textile workers, and the Kheda peasants, etc. These struggles witnessed his specific mode of agitation, widely known as Satyagrah, which he had earlier developed in the South African context and through which he was successful in achieving his socio-economic and political goals. In a meeting held on May 2, 2018, ShriRãmNãthKovind, the Hon'ble President of India, said, "Mahatma Gandhi was the inspiration for our largely non-violent, inclusive and democratic freedom struggle. He remains the ethical benchmark against which we test public men and women, political ideas and govt. policies, and the hopes and wishes of our country..." In the similar way, Judith M Brown and Anthony Parel in their Cambridge Companion to Gandhi (2011) aver that, "Gandhi has often been compared to Karl Marx because of his utilitarian justification."On a similar note, Dr S. Radhakrishnan calls him the supreme religion, the essence of all religions and a symbol of communal unity and universal humanity.

Gandhi's thoughts, words and activism, thus, continue to inspire and influence various forms of epistemologies and augment several streams of ontological tools. Many branches of the Humanities and Social Sciences are taught under the rubric of Gandhian philosophy. There arises, therefore, a question as how Gandhi was relevant in the previous century and how he still remains relevant in present scenario.

The proposed seminar looks forward to receiving papers on the Gandhian discourses in Humanities and Social Sciences and the other allied areas. The possible themes may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Font & size: Times New Roman 12, Line Spacing: 1.5, Margin of 1 inch on all four sides. Text of the paper: justified.
- Title of the paper: bold, title case (Capitalize each word), centered. Times New Roman 14.
- References: Please follow MLA (Ed. 7th) style. Use End Notes if required. Attach a list of Works Cited at the end of the paper.
- Articles should be submitted as MS Word 2003-2010 attachments only.
- Approximate length of the paper: 3000 words.
- Each paper must be accompanied by i) A declaration that it is an original piece of work and has not been published anywhere else or sent for publication ii) Abstract of paper about 150-200 words and iii) A short bio-note of the contributor(s) indicating name, institutional affiliation, postal address, mobile number and e-mail, in a single attachment.
- Papers submitted should evince serious research contributing new knowledge or innovative critical/theoretical perspectives on the subject being analyzed.

Transportations:

Jaipur is well-connected with Rail, Road and Air. NIT-UK Satellite Campus (MNIT, Jaipur) is 5.4 km away from Jaipur International Airport whereas Gandhinagar (Jaipur) is the nearest railway station.
